Dear Parents/ Carers and all the St Edward's Family,

It has been the most wonderful year at St Edward's and I wanted to thank you for all your support on behalf of all of our staff. I am delighted to announce fantastic results for our end of year examinations across the school. A special mention must be the officially published data, such as our great SATS results in Y6 and in Y2, our phonics results in Y1, our Multiplication Test results in Y4 and the Reception profile scores. Indeed in Y6, our children averaged a pass mark of between 88% and 95%, compared to a national average of 70%.

Our children continue to be an inspiration to us, and this year we have given out more Gold letters, more postcards, more house-points and more Gospel Value bookmarks than ever before. Our ambition remains that every child will receive a whole host of rewards for excellent behaviour and effort throughout the year.

There are too many highlights from this year to mention all of them, but we must note our Commonwealth Choir children performing for HRH Princes Anne and our fabulous visit to the school by Roberta Moore (Bobby Moore's daughter), which featured on ITV News and the Daily Mirror Newspaper. We have also had the wonderful class assemblies, the fabulous school reports, the beautiful masses, the Rocksteady Concerts, the Family Fun Day with special guest appearances by 2 West Ham footballers, the countless sporting trophies, the continued upgrade of our school library, the new partnership with Green Street Library and the new Reading Eggs programme, the Y6 Graduation attending by the Rt Hon Sir Stephen Timms MP, the Achievement Awards presentation in the presence of Bishop Alan, the Art trips, our themed Weeks including Aspirations Week, our Inclusion Quality Mark Award, our Summer Soiree, our Y6 Leavers' Assembly and this list goes on

Going forward, we want to continue to build on our excellent partnership with you the parents and carers and our Parish community. We are delighted that our Chaplaincy Team, our Pupil Parliament and our Mini-Vinnies have a big contribution to our school this year. Plus, we had our Cafod appeal, our Citizenship programme and our continued activities with all of our Trust schools. Plus, we had our coffee mornings and curriculum based evenings to keep you all fully informed.

We would like to thank our PTA for all of their marvellous efforts this year in fundraising and creating great experiences for the children. They are already working on a great list of events, so we look forward to another amazing year. A big thank you to all of our fabulous staff and Governors, who have worked so hard once again this year, creating our brilliant young learners.


So we will continue to grow together, working in partnership with you and the parish, towards an even greater St Edward's.


Edwardian's Programme


Father Denis Cup came home








Awards Afternoon




Year 6 leaver's Assembly

Gospel Reading: Matthew 12:1-8

At that time Jesus went through the cornfields on the Sabbath. His disciples were hungry, and they began to pluck ears of corn and to eat. But when the Pharisees saw it, they said to him, "Look, your disciples are doing what is not lawful to do on the Sabbath." He said to them, "Have you not read what David did when he was hungry, and those who were with him: how he entered the house of God and ate the bread of the Presence, which it was not lawful for him to eat nor for those who were with him, but only for the priests? Or have you not read in the Law how on the Sabbath the priests in the temple profane the Sabbath and are guiltless? I tell you, something greater than the temple is here. And if you had known what this means, 'I desire mercy, and not sacrifice,' you would not have condemned the guiltless. For the Son of Man is lord of the Sabbath."

Gospel Reflection

Religious practices and traditions, rules, and injunctions are good and needed. They manifest the spirit of piety and devotion. They show in concrete how much we care about God. They open us to insights and inspirations. They act as balms for consolation, guidance, and strength. They discipline us and guard us against possible aberrations.

However, their fruit and effect cannot be limited only to the spiritual domain. Any true devotion must eventually lead one to a concrete life of fraternity in acts of charity. Acts of devotion without acts of benevolence are deficient and incomplete. Piety without fraternity is shallow. Adherence to the rules is important but not at the cost of neglecting the need of the other.

This shallow religion is seen in the Pharisees. The hungry disciples of Jesus pluck grain and eat on a Sabbath day. The Pharisees vehemently blame them for breaking the Sabbath. They interpret plucking the ears of corn as part of harvesting, a work forbidden on the Sabbath. How narrow-minded and perverted they were!

They do not bother about the hunger of their fellow humans; rather they over-bother about the law. They forget the fact that human well-being is more important than the mere keeping of the law. Jesus then had to remind them two things: that the "Son of Man is lord of Sabbath" and this means that all the laws are subservient to him and no law is above him. Second, "God desires mercy and not sacrifice".
